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






Global fisheries subsidies - Types



WTO covered fisheries subsidies - Types




WTO covered subsidies by major region




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WTO covered subsidies by development status


Small-scale fisheries (including artisanal and subsistence) 2 billion USD = 11%




WTO covered subsidies by sector and subsidy Type

Challenges and caveats of analysis

- Lack of data, details and transparency;
 - using assumptions such as catch data as a proxy for sector size can lead to some bias;
 - regions with especially low information availability include Middle and western Africa, Western Asia, Micronesia and Polynesia.
- database could be improved through in depth regional/national/local studies.




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


Scenarios where exceptions to SSF could apply
